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PROGRAMME DESCRIPTION

CIYDC's mission includes providing communities with the resources and information they need to organize and mobilize individuals and groups on behalf of youth. The planning for youth success initiative is the intentional approach of CIYDC to coordinate communities across the Cayman Islands as they engage and mobilize to develop the assets of their young people.

Community initiatives based on the Developmental Assets, work thoughtfully to determine how people in all spheres of life can be involved. There are five action strategies identified by the Search Institute for transforming a community towards positive change.

Influence civic decisions - by influencing decision makers and opinion leaders to leverage financial, media, and policy resources in support of this positive transformation of communities and society.

Engage adults from all walks of life to develop sustained, strength-building relationships with children and adolescents, both within families and in neighborhoods.

Activate sectors of the community-such as schools, congregations, businesses, and youth, human service, and health-care organizations-to create an asset-building culture and to contribute fully to young people's healthy development.

Invigorate programs to become more asset rich and to be available to and accessed by all children and youth.

Mobilize young people to use their power as asset builders and change agents.

WORKSHOP OVERVIEW

Workshop: Organization Capacity Building "Infusing asset building in your organizations"

Purpose of Workshop: Implement CIYDC action strategy of invigorating programs to become more asset rich that create a positive climate for young people to learn and reach their optimum potential.

Workshop Goal: Increase participant's knowledge about asset building and youth development and create an action plan to incorporate these strategies into participant's daily practice through an interactive, team building workshop.

Workshop Objectives: At the conclusion of this workshop, participants will have/learn:

- an increased awareness of the Search Institute's 40 Developmental AssetsTM, and developed strategies to build assets with youth;
- strategies and best practices for infusing asset building principles into organization leadership, practices and operations.
- detailed information about connections between the asset framework and youth success;
- how they can intentionally implement asset-building strategies in their curriculum and instruction, and create an action plan to incorporate strategies into participant's daily practice

Workshop Activities

After a brief welcome, invocation and overview of the workshop, the participants completed the asset bingo ice breaker activity. Background information was then given about the developmental assets framework and Cayman Islands Youth Development Consortium. The participants had an opportunity to do two warm up activities as well—a skills audit and another ice breaker activity wherein they had to go to three persons in the room to answer to what I do, who I am and what I value. Each participant had to write something nice about the person they interviewed and place that note in their envelope. At the end of the exercise participants read the notes they received. Some of them shared their notes to the large group.

Thirty persons attended the onsite workshop on November 5th 2022 and five persons attended online on December 3rd, 2022. The participants were from various organizations—John Gray Memorial Church Afterschool programs, Youth Services Unit, Grace Christian Academy PTA, Cadet Corps, Child Evangelism Fellowship, Alex Panton Foundation. National Youth Commission, Church of God Chapel West Bay Youth Group, Literacy if For Everyone, Big Brothers, Big Sisters, Interschool/Intervarsity Christian Fellowship, Rotary Club of Grand Cayman Sunrise, FTJC Sunday School, Cayman International School, Elmslie Memorial United Church, Sir John A Cumber Primary School, Webster Memorial United Church, Savannah United Church, CAYS Foundation, GirlForce100, University College of the Cayman Islands.

The workshop evaluation covered participant knowledge before and after the workshop, the workshop content and presentation quality, as well as what they appreciated and learned in the sessions, planned to do and suggestions to improve the workshop.

PARTICIPANT KNOWLEDGE

Knowledge Prior to Workshop

- Non-existent 22% - Low 22% - Fair 33% - Adequate 17% - High 6%

Knowledge After the Workshop

- Adequate 50% - High 50%

Prior to the workshop 44% of the participants indicated their knowledge was non-existent or low. After the workshop half of the participants indicated that their knowledge was adequate and the other half was high.

WORKSHOP CONTENT AND PRESENTATION QUALITY




Figure 1: Workshop Content

The workshop content got good ratings. As seen in figure 1, all participants either agreed or strongly agree with each item. Most strongly agreed that the presentation increased their knowledge and understanding of asset building and youth development, provided them with strategies to use in their work to build youth assets, and made them more aware of the link between asset building and student success. All participants agreed to share the information they learned with their colleagues, family and friends.




Figure 2: Presentation Quality

The presentation quality also got good ratings as all participants either agreed or strongly agreed with each item. As seen in figure 2, most participants strongly agreed that the presentation was effective. They strongly agreed that the facilitators were knowledgeable and clear, encouraged participation, stayed on the agenda and respected presentation time. However, some suggested a better flow and indications to follow the material.

Conclusions, Implications & Recommendations

Conclusions and Implications

Although the number of participants was below the target amount, CIYDC is pleased that the participants that attended benefited from the workshop. The results of the workshop evaluation indicate the significance of the content presented.

The objectives of the workshop were achieved

- ✓ an increased awareness of the Search Institute's 40 Developmental AssetsTM, and developed strategies to build assets with youth;
- ✓ strategies and best practices for infusing asset building principles into organization leadership, practices and operations.
- ✓ detailed information about connections between the asset framework and youth success;
- ✓ provided information how participants can intentionally implement asset-building strategies in their curriculum and instruction, and create an action plan to incorporate strategies into participant's daily practice

The venue was not ideal but we are grateful that Mr. James Myles secured the venue for the workshop held in November. Lack of funds meant resorting to an online version of the workshop, which worked out well, even though the number was small.

Despite sending out emails to organizations and promoting the workshop on social media the attendance of youth practitioners was small.

Recommendations

This workshop required administrative and logistic support. As indicated in previous reports CIYDC is in need of a fully functional secretariat that can provide the administrative support for all of its programs and activities.

Partnership with government for access to facilities to host workshops like these, especially if being held in each district.

The three main recommendations for improving attendance are:-

- Ministry responsible for youth and education encourage their service providers to attend
- Youth Services Unit promote to youth agencies they serve
- Partner with media to promote

The first two recommended solutions are critical as the ministry and YSU have direct communication with individuals that work with our youth. Also, collaboration and partnership will increase the workshop's success, resulting in government receiving a return of its investment for its full sponsorship of the workshop.



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
